The Board of Trustees meets quarterly and as necessary Its function is the governance and oversight of the organization, approval of budgets and the development of future strategy

A group of the charity's volunteers administer the operations of the charity alongside the secretary and the two appointed freelance Artistic Directors, freelance Festival Producer and Concert Manager. This group, together with other volunteers, constitutes the Management Committee. The Committee meets throughout the year, and also functions in the form of a series of smaller sub-groups who advise on detailed planning and policy issues to take to the full Committee. Many communications are done by email as well as at the meetings of the members.

The festival benefits from an extraordinary level of committed support from volunteers. The events within the festival itself are run by a group of around 70 volunteers, acting under the guidance of the Management Committee. These volunteers are mostly local people, many of them skilled amateur musicians, who bring to the organisation a wide range of abilities and who are united by their enthusiasm for and interest in the types of music presented in the festival

The principal activities of Brighton Early Music Festival during the year continued to achieve the charity's objectives through the organisation of an annual early music festival, involving concerts, dramatic performances and other cultural events, and through the provision of workshops for adults and schoolchildren and training opportunities for both professional and amateur musicians

The charity's aim to reach out to young people was encouraged by offering concession prices to the festival for people aged under 25 and free entrance children aged under 12

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

The charity's objectives are

- 1 To encourage, advance, develop and maintain public education in, appreciation of and involvement in pre-classical and classical music and the performing arts by promoting periodically a series of public concerts, dramatic performances, exhibitions and other cultural events
- 2 To promote and assist in the advancement of public and professional education by the provision of workshops, lectures and educational events in pre-classical and classical music and the performing arts, particularly, but not exclusively, for younger people, and to encourage the giving of public performances by schools, music societies, choirs and other like organisations

The principal activities of Brighton Early Music Festival during the year ending January 2012 continued to achieve the charity's objectives through the organisation of an annual early music festival, involving concerts, dramatic performances and other cultural events, and through the provision of workshops for adults and schoolchildren and training opportunities for both professional and amateur musicians

The charity's aim to reach out to young people was also achieved by the workshop and performance opportunities as well as offering concession prices or free entrance to the festival for people aged under 25 and children aged under 12 respectively

In its 10th year ending 31 January 2013 the Brighton Early Music Festival continued the successes of previous years in fulfilling the objectives of the charity as follows

- 18 events across Brighton & Hove including concerts, pre-concert talks and discussions, workshops and a Fun Run
- reviewed/recommended in The Independent, The Times, and The Telegraph and two appearances on BBC Radio 3's In Tune
- volunteering opportunities for around 70 local people
- 3,157 festival tickets were sold in 2012 and additionally more than 450 people attended the free Autumn Lates event on 27th October
- continued to take concerts to new places by experimenting with concert format and exploring links with other art forms, including Brighton-based aerial dance company Zu Aerial

- A record number of local people took part in the festival, either by singing in one of the three BREMF choirs or by taking part in a workshop
- continued support for young artists not only the 21 young professional musicians in 5 ensembles taking part in the 2012 Early Music Live! scheme but also a number of Early Music Live! participants from previous years
- diversified our funding model to cope with the challenges of not receiving Arts Council funding in 2012, raising more than an additional £5,000 from donors, particularly through the launch of a higher level giving scheme
- collaborated with local suppliers and businesses including security firm Select Security, stage crew company and Chichester-based lighting designers Pitch Black Lighting

The 10th anniversary was celebrated by an extraordinary event, a rare production of the Renaissance spectacular The 1589 Florentine Intermedi (which saw aerial dancers scaling the heights of St Bartholomew's Church) This ambitious extravaganza included a late Renaissance 'orchestra', including theorbos, sackbuts, and cornets, string and woodwind ensembles, local specialist choir BREMF Consort of Voices and The Renaissance Singers from London, professional singers as well as the amazing acrobatic aerial dances of Zu Aerial was given in two performances to a packed house. We succeeded in our mission to provide the widest possible access to excellent early music performances, including

- nurturing young professional musicians
- opportunities for the community to get involved in making music, whatever their previous experience
- reaching new audiences for early and classical music
- building a community of individuals who are engaged in every aspect of the organisation as volunteers, performers, donors
  - In the year BREMF educational activities continued through
- the school programme reaching over 1,000 young people
- running 3 vocal ensembles (complete beginners to outstanding amateurs)
- providing training, mentoring and performance opportunities for young professional
  ensembles through the Early Music Live! scheme, providing professional development and
  training, performing and workshop opportunities in local schools and introducing
  opportunities with other promoters and the BBC

#### Not an everyday festival

BREMF @ Autumn Lates was a key initiative within the 2012 Festival The BREMF performances were part of a series which included performances and events by other local organisations (including Duke of Yorks, Same Sky, Photo Biennial, Fabrica and Marlborough Theatre) who had, like BREMF, been involved with the previous White Night festivals – a free late-night festival across Brighton and Hove that encouraged people to try new experiences and a different kind of night-time activity

- two showcase performances featuring five young ensembles taking part in the festival's 2012 Early Music Live! scheme
- stripped down performance space with the audience free to move around and to sit or lie on the floor
- performances showcased music from the 16th to 19th centuries and included collaborations with a dancer, shadow-puppeteer, film-maker, actor and singer

More than 450 people attended the BREMF @ Autumn Lates performances on Saturday 27th October 2012, "It was enchanting - one of the best concerts that I've been to in years. The setting in St Barts and the darkness, with us all sitting or lying on the floor, was wonderful, I found it quite moving. It was clear that everyone else was captivated by it too - there wasn't a sound from anyone. It is hard to
