STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The administration of the charity is undertaken by the following:

The Board of Trustees meets quarterly and as necessary. Its function is the governance and oversight of the organization, approval of budgets and the development of future strategy.

A group of the charity's volunteers administer the operations of the charity alongside the secretary and the two appointed freelance Artistic Directors, freelance Festival Producer and Concert Manager. This group, together with other volunteers, constitutes the Management Committee. The Committee meets throughout the year, and also functions in the form of a series of smaller sub-groups who advise on detailed planning and policy issues to take to the full Committee. Many communications are done by email as well as at the meetings of the members.

Volunteers

The festival benefits from an extraordinary level of committed support from volunteers. The events within the festival itself are run by a group of around 80 volunteers, acting under the guidance of the Management Committee. These volunteers are mostly local people, many of them skilled amateur musicians, who bring to the organisation a wide range of abilities and who are united by their enthusiasm for and interest in the types of music presented in the festival.

New Trustees, when appointed, receive information to brief them on their legal obligations under charity and company law, the content of the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the activities of the Board of Trustees and the Management Committee and its decision-making processes, and details concerning the recent financial performance of the charity. They meet other Trustees and voluntary administrators involved in the day-to-day running of the charity. Trustees are encouraged to attend appropriate external training events where these will facilitate their roles within the charity. The Trustees and Management Committee actively review, on a regular basis, the major risks that the charity faces and have established rigorous systems and procedures to mitigate any significant risks

identified.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The charity's objectives are:

- 1. To encourage, advance, develop and maintain public education in, appreciation of and involvement in pre-classical and classical music and the performing arts by promoting periodically a series of public concerts, dramatic performances, exhibitions and other cultural events.
- 2. To promote and assist in the advancement of public and professional education by the provision of workshops, lectures and educational events in pre-classical and classical music and the performing arts, particularly, but not exclusively, for younger people, and to encourage the giving of public performances by schools, music societies, choirs and other like organisations.

The principal activities of Brighton Early Music Festival during the year ending January 2015 continued to achieve the charity's objectives through the organisation of an annual early music festival, involving concerts, dramatic performances and other cultural events, and through the provision of workshops for adults and schoolchildren and training opportunities for both professional and amateur musicians.

The charity's aim to reach out to young people was encouraged by offering concession prices to the festival for people aged under 25 including £5 prom tickets and free entrance for children aged under 12.

ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

In its 12th year ending 31 January 2015 Brighton Early Music Festival continued the successes of previous years in fulfilling the objectives of the charity as follows

- 26 Festival events in 10 venues across Brighton and Hove, attended by around 4,000 people
- In addition, 125 people attended the free late-night Compline event on 25th October
- Four participatory workshops attended by 200 local singers and instrumentalists, two of which led to participation in Festival concerts
- Through the Early Music Live! scheme seventeen young musicians in four ensembles were mentored, as well as seven young singers who were part of the final Festival concert
- New £5 Prom tickets, which were taken up by 225 people this year, to increase access to our concerts
- Continued to support our three BREMF choirs including the BREMF Community Choir which has gone from strength to strength in the past few years and in 2014 had their own concert in the Festival for the first time
- First family concerts as part of the 2014 Festival, which were attended by 195 children and their families
- Involved the young singers of the Brighton Festival Youth Choir in one of our festival concerts
- More than 400 children aged from 6 to 15 took part in our Watercycle project with the

Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment

- Worked with homeless and vulnerably housed people at First Base Day Centre to create a digital music piece which was premiered at The Night Shift on 17th October
- Set up a 16-30 user group to engage with younger audiences
- Continued to experiment with concert format, with several 'picnic' concerts, and events in which the music and action moved around the venue
- Built on links with other Brighton organisations, including link-ups with Brighton Dome, Strings Attached Coffee Concerts, Southern Early Music Forum, and Brighton College
- Supported **four** young graduates through our Festival Trainee scheme, providing them with experience and support in their first steps towards a career in Arts Administration
- Increased the number of volunteers involved with the Festival to **over 80** our largest number ever

We succeeded in our mission: to provide the widest possible access to excellent early music performances, including:

- Nurturing young professional musicians
- Opportunities for the community to get involved in making music, whatever their previous experience
 - Reaching new audiences for early and classical music
 - Building a community of individuals who are engaged in every aspect of the organisation as volunteers, performers, donors.

In the year BREMF educational activities continued through:

- The schools programme in conjunction with the OAE
- Running 3 vocal ensembles (complete beginners to outstanding amateurs)
- Providing training, mentoring and performance opportunities for young professional ensembles through the Early Music Live! scheme, providing professional development and training, performing and workshop opportunities in local schools and introducing opportunities with other promoters and the BBC.

Brighton Early Music Live!

Brighton Early Music Live is one of the most respected mentoring and development schemes for young early music ensembles in the UK, combining a performance in the Festival with training opportunities and support.

The scheme is about more than just short-term performance opportunities - it also provides young musicians with the wider skills necessary for life as a well-rounded professional musician in the 21st century. In 2014 we mentored seventeen musicians in four ensembles, who benefitted from workshops on:

- Fundraising
- Business skills & strategic planning
- How to develop marketable programmes and eye-catching publicity material
- Devising and delivering education and outreach work
- Managing a successful ensemble

In 2014 we worked with new partner organisations including The Royal Academy of Music and Genesis Sixteen in order to widen our range of training opportunities, which were very well received by participants. Their feedback included: "I have been at various music institutions over the years and this was the by far the most useful, practical and clear guide to promoting a new ensemble." The final event of the scheme is a training session for the ensembles on education work (delivered in collaboration with the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment in 2014) and a day of workshops for each ensemble in Brighton & Hove Primary Schools. The ensembles visited six schools and performed to more than 600 children between the ages of 4 and 11.

Feedback from the schools included: "the children LOVED their workshop on Wednesday, and it has improved their singing so much. I taught them today, and really noticed how carefully they were all listening to each other when performing, and a couple have really come out of their shell. The power of music!" Music Co-ordinator, West Blatchington Primary School

NEW AUDIENCES

The Festival has always sought to encourage new audiences, and in 2014 wanted to explore the barriers around young people attending classical events.

We established a User Group for 16-30 year olds, starting with 6 members, and growing to 13 as the year progressed. At the first meeting, we quickly identified ticket price as one key area which was stopping people attending, particularly if the repertoire was unfamiliar to them. On the advice of the User Group we launched a new range of £5 Prom tickets for the 2014 Festival, offering standing places or restricted view seats for almost all events. These were marketed and sold by members of the User Group, and proved a runaway success - with more than 225 sold in 2014.

PARTNERSHIPS

We increased our reach and profile through partnerships with other local organisations. Link-ups with Glyndebourne, the Orchestra of the Age of Enlightenment, Royal Academy of Music, Genesis Sixteen, Brighton Dome and Strings Attached Coffee Concerts and Brighton College helped us to attract new audiences and bring innovative projects to the festival.

CONSTANT IMPROVEMENT AND DEVELOPMENT

Buoyed by the continuing success and confidence of the festival we developed plans for the 2015 festival at an earlier stage and were therefore able to run our first crowdfunded project- our #freeruggiero appeal for the 2015 festival during the 2014 events. This proved very successful reaching almost double its original target. Ambitious plans for 2015 include BREMF's performances of the first opera written by a female composer, Francesca Caccini.

SUMMARY

In a year of many challenges for the arts Brighton Early Music Festival once again proved that innovation, imagination and artistic excellence could continue to offer an opportunity for audiences to hear music they may not know performed in a manner which makes it fresh and exciting. The success of this approach is shown by the many sold out concerts, the excellent reviews, the superb performances and the commitment of all who are involved in helping to run the organisation. By listening to and involving the audience the festival is able to incorporate suggestions and ideas into future programming and to be confident that there is a real appetite for the BREMF vision.

Thanks once more to our extraordinary team of committed volunteers, our funders, all the performers and organisers of events and most importantly our artistic directors.

PLANS FOR FUTURE PERIODS

EDUCATION

In the Spring term of 2015 four ensembles from the 2014/15 Early Music Live scheme visited eight Brighton & Hove primary schools and performed to a total of 650 children between the ages of 4 and 11. The Festival also worked with the BREMF Community Choir to devise and implement a project based on Purcell's Dido and Aeneas which will culminate in 60 children from two local primary schools taking part in the choir's performance in June 2015.

Education work linked to the 2015 Festival will focus on a project for secondary schools linked to the Francesca Caccini opera La Liberazione di Ruggiero. Participants will have the opportunity to work with a composer to develop their own compositions in response to the themes in the opera which they will perform at The Old Market in Hove. The project will have a particular emphasis on encouraging girls to have confidence in their composition skills.

YOUNG ARTISTS

In addition to accepting five ensembles onto our Early Music Live scheme for 2015/16 we also auditioned more than 30 young singers for the smaller roles in La Liberazione di Ruggiero. From this pool of talent, we were able to offer 11 young artists roles in the opera, and look forward to working with them this autumn. The soloists in Handel's Acis and Galatea with the BREMF Players and Singers will also be young artists.
